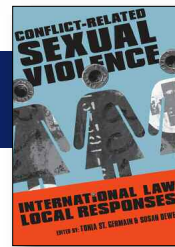
Unique in its breadth of coverage, this carefully designed collection presents the key documents of international law at the global level.
